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From the CEO

This quarter marked one year since the launch of Australia's newest domain namespace, .au direct. Its introduction in March 2022 was the culmination of a multi-year project for auDA and Australia's domain name industry, and a significant innovation for Australian internet users, offering greater choice of short, memorable, Australian domain names.

We were pleased to see users respond positively, with more than 740,000 .au direct registrations by the end of Q1, supporting Australians to create a new, distinct online identity.

The popularity of .au direct has also bolstered growth in overall .au domain name registrations. According to the latest *Verisign Domain Name Brief* (released in March 2023), .au is now the seventh largest country code Top Level Domain (ccTLD) and 10th largest Top Level Domain (TLD), making it one of the most popular domains globally.

In March, in support of our role to deliver a stable, secure and reliable .au, we attended the Department of Home Affairs' inaugural Cyber and Infrastructure Security (CIS) Conference in Sydney. There, alongside other Australian critical infrastructure providers, we heard from cyber security experts and participated in business resilience exercises. To deepen our cyber security expertise, we also attended the Australian Information Security Association (AISA) Australian Cyber Conference (CyberCon) in Canberra. Both conferences were a great opportunity for auDA to continue to contribute to a more resilient Australia.

Over the quarter, our Compliance Team maintained high levels of compliance with the .au Licencing Rules and continued to drive down DNS abuse in .au. The team also offered summer internships to four university students. The opportunity provided them practical experience and expanded their understanding of the domain name sector.

Internet policy and governance were also an area of focus in Q1. Representatives from auDA attended and participated in the 76th meeting of the Internet Corporation for Assigned Names and Numbers (ICANN76) and the 83rd meeting of the Asia Pacific Top Level Domains Association (APTLD83). auDA joined sessions on reducing DNS abuse, improving multi-stakeholder internet governance processes, the digital divide, the impact of developing technologies and more.

Our work advocating for multi-stakeholder internet governance over Q1 included bringing members of the Australian internet community together. In February, we hosted a roundtable to explore how Australia can build momentum locally to contribute to global action to sustain the multi-stakeholder model of internet governance. We also sponsored the ANU Tech Policy Design Centre's Tech Policy Futures event at Parliament House in Canberra, where tech and digital experts shared insights on the future of digital policies and governance.

In addition, over the quarter we also hosted a series of .au member events that took us from Melbourne with RMIT's Technology Coalition, to four stops across regional and metropolitan Queensland and to Ballarat in regional Victoria. We are always delighted to meet with and hear from current and prospective members and these events were no exception.

Another Q1 highlight was the announcement of the successful recipients of the auDA Foundation 2022 Grant Round.

Each of the 15 recipients have received \$40,000 for their proposed education, research or community project that will enhance the utility of the internet for the benefit of Australians.

Once again, I extend my congratulations to the recipients and look forward to seeing the impact their projects make.

The first quarter of the year was also a time for annual planning. auDA staff spent three days together focussed on establishing shared priorities for the 2023-24 financial year, while the auDA Board came together as a group to review key governance arrangements.

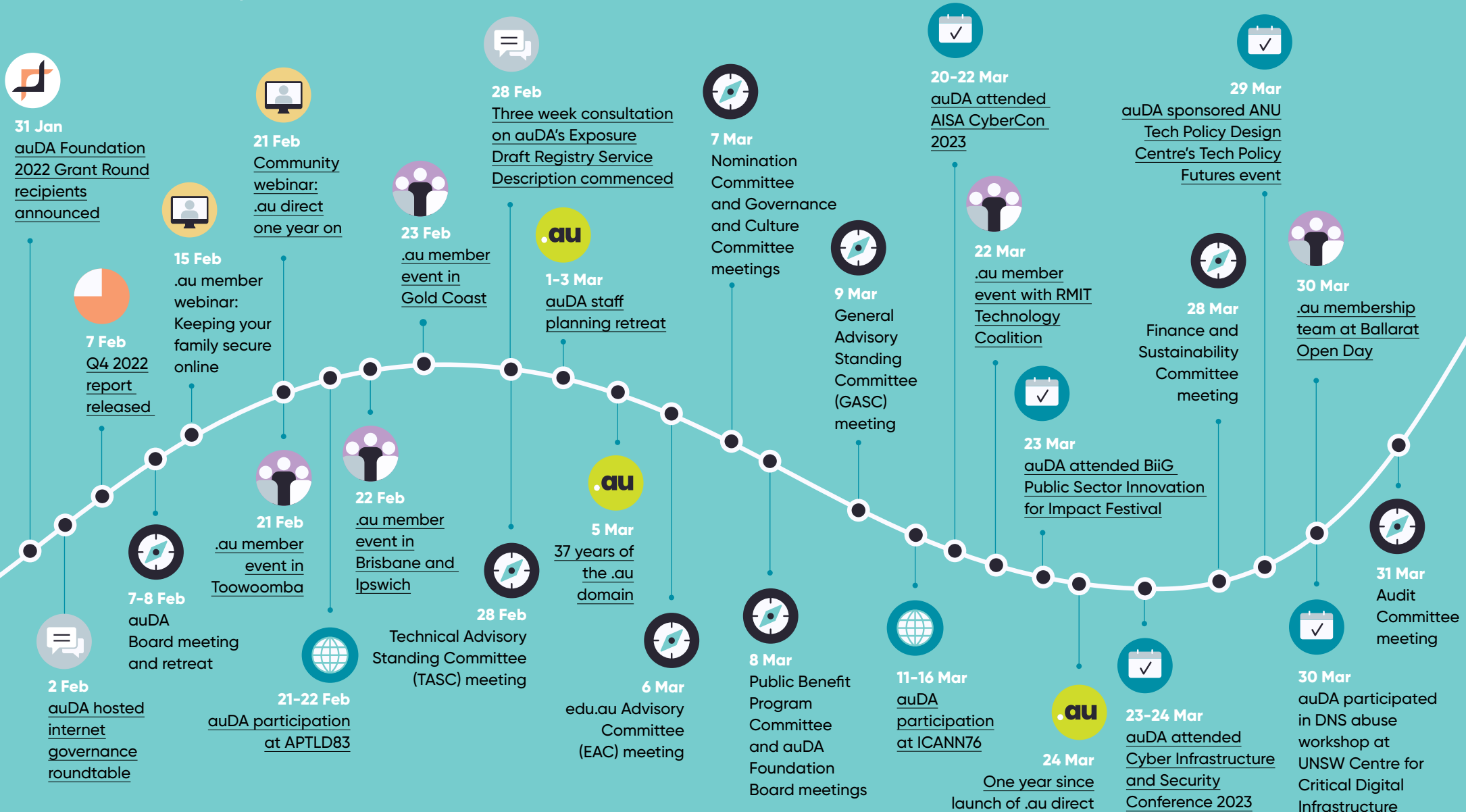
Following changes to the Board composition in November 2022, five Board Committees were established to support the auDA Board in fulfilling its role.

Finally, in March we released an Exposure Draft Registry Service Description for public consultation. This was a first step towards our upcoming tender to appoint a .au registry operator from 1 July 2024. The tender will be released in Q2 and ensure auDA continues to deliver reliable, trusted services on the .au domain into the future.

As we look forward, the auDA Team is energised for another exciting quarter supporting Australians through .au and an open, free, secure and global internet.

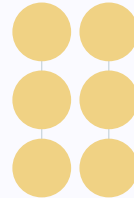

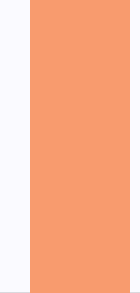

* .au membership transitioned to a new model on 27 September 2022, as set out in auDA's Constitution. 3,170 Associate Members opted-in to the terms and conditions of the new model and became auDA Members under the Constitution.
